Launched in 2021, our Simons Center Fellows program gathered momentum through 2022, doubling our roster of Fellows by year's end to 22, nine of which are lifetime Fellows. The Simons Center's Fellows program is a growing community of students, academics, and practitioners who are contributing to the body of knowledge for ethical leadership and interagency operations through intellectual discourse contributions to the Center's efforts. Fellows have access to the Simons Center's expansive library of journals, special reports, and papers. In July, Fellows were also invited to Col. Matt Dimmick's "Battlefield Update Briefing" to the Arter-Rowland National Security Forum on the war in Ukraine.

The Simons Center is now honored to include two distinguished leaders as Senior Research Fellows: retired Maj. Gen. Gordon "Skip" Davis, Jr. and retired Lt. Gen. Robert. L. Caslen. Davis, a former NATO Deputy Assistant Secretary General for Defense Investment, delivered an overview of the 2022 NATO Summit during a special online presentation to the Arter-Rowland National Security Forum which Fellows were invited to attend. The Simons Center is scheduled to bring Caslen, a former Combined Arms Center Commander and Superintendent at West Point, to Fort Leavenworth and Kansas City for a program in March 2023.

n 2022, the CGSC Foundation's Simons Center hosted 12 meetings of the Arter-Rowland National Security Forum (ARNSF). Two of those were conducted in the virtual environment while the other 10 were conducted at the Carriage Club in Kansas City. The Global Supply Chain and Kansas City, Jan. 27, 2022



The January 2022 meeting of the Forum entitled "The Global Supply Chain and Kansas City" featured Mr. Keith Prather, one of the founders and managing directors of Armada Corporate Intelligence, and retired U.S. Army Col. Matthew Dimmick, former White House Advisor and National Security Professional. Prather and Dimmick discussed the current state of the supply chain, specific vulnerabilities, and its national security implications.

Russian Military • March 17, 2022



Retired U.S. Army Col. Matthew Dimmick returned as the presenter in March 2022 and provided the Forum with a presentation on the capabilities of the Russian military. Dimmick offered his personal insights based on his experience gained as the Russia Director for the Secretary of Defense from 2016 to 2019; the Defense Attache in Tbilisi, Georgia; Deputy Foreign Policy Advisor for the Chief of Staff of the Army; and Assistant Army Attache in Moscow.

Cultures and Empires • May 26, 2022

In May 2022 Dr. Mahir Ibrahimov, the director of the Cultural and Area Studies Office (CASO) at CGSC and author of "Across Cultures and **Empires: An Immigrant's Odyssey** from the Soviet Army to the U.S. War in Iraq and American Citizenship," spoke about his journey from serving in the Soviet army as an Azeri minority, to immigrating to the United States in search of freedom.

the Forum and their guests meet periodically at guest speaker events in downtown Kansas City. National and regional guest speakers representing all elements of national power (Diplomatic, Informational, Military and Economic) highlight the meetings. The Forum is nonpartisan, but elected government officials may present from time to time.

The Forum is named after Lt. Gen. (Ret.) Robert Arter, Founding Chairman of the CGSC Foundation, and Mr. Landon Rowland, the Foundation's first major donor who was well-known in Kansas City for his keen interest in national security issues and his leadership in business and philanthropy.

In February 2022 the topic shifted to Virtual Warfare with a presentation from retired Col. Steve Banach who addressed national security in an environment where warfare has shifted from the physical to a virtual space with Russia and China as the United State's greatest competitors.

A fter more than a year without publishing the *InterAgency Journal* (IAJ) due to COVID-19, we released our spring and fall editions online during 2022.

The spring edition featured articles from across the interagency community covering topics ranging from the shape of future wars to foreign policy to the emerging Sino-U.S. naval arms race.

In addition to articles from the wider interagency community, the fall edition contains several articles from CGSC students who participated in our Interagency Writing Award Competition.

Furthermore, Simons Center Fellow Lt. Col. Ken Segelhorst published an excellent *InterAgency Paper* on the famous Son Tay Raid, led by Col. Arthur D. "Bull" Simons in 1970.

In early 2022, the Simons Center continued its Cold War Symposium, begun the prior November, in two online seminars featuring presentations by subject matter experts covering the Cold War and events afterward. The purpose of the Cold War Symposium was to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the end of the Cold War, to promote scholarship, and to recognize the contributions of those who participated in that global struggle, especially the United States and its allies in NATO. Following the last of the online seminars, the presenters authored chapters for our upcoming book entitled *The End of the Cold War and its Aftermath*. Edited by Dr. Mark Wilcox from the CGSC Department of Joint, Interagency and Multinational Operations, and Dr. Sean Kalic from the CGSC Department of Military History, the book is to be published in 2023.
